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Annie Collins

Annie Collins is the associate administrator for field operations with the U.S. Department of Transportation Federal Motor Carrier Safety. In this position, she oversees and coordinates the work of more than 800 safety professionals in approximately 80 offices across the United States and its territories. She also coordinates the efforts of 12,000 state and local law enforcement officials who save lives through the effective enforcement of safety standards. Prior to this, Ms. Collins enjoyed a distinguished 21-year career in the Massachusetts state government, including serving as executive director of the Massachusetts Department of Transportation Accelerated Bridge Program where she significantly improved the structural quality of the state's bridges. She was also the Registrar of Motor Vehicles, the CEO responsible for the management and oversight of the state's driver licensing, vehicle registration and inspection operations. Under her leadership, Massachusetts reduced teen fatalities by 75 percent and increased enforcement of tough drunk driving laws. During her tenure, customer service was also dramatically improved by developing internet transactions and through the efficient redesign of branch office services. In addition, Ms. Collins introduced the use of fraud-fighting technology, including facial recognition software to enhance the security of the driver's license and to support local law enforcement.

Charley English

Charley English was appointed director of the Georgia Emergency Management Agency/Homeland Security in February 2006 and has been with the agency since 1996. He also serves as the state's homeland security director. During his tenure, he has had leadership responsibility in 12 disasters declared by the president, two National Special Security Events (the Centennial Olympic Games and G8) and numerous governor-declared states of emergency.

He currently serves as president of the National Emergency Management Association, chair of the Governor's Commission on 9-1-1 modernization and state point of contact for the FirstNet Public Safety Broadband Network. Prior to joining GEMA, Mr. English was responsible for overseeing law enforcement training at Georgia's ten regional police academies as director of training for the Peace Officer Standards and Training (POST) Council. He also worked with the Clayton County Police Department for eight years, serving his last assignment as the regional police academy director.

Jeremy Greenberg

Jeremy Greenberg serves as the manager for the U.S. Department of Transportation's National Response Program. In this capacity, he is responsible for coordinating emergency support functions and the Regional Emergency Transportation Program. Prior to this, Mr. Greenberg was the deputy manager for the U.S. Department of Transportation's Crisis Management Center.

He came to transportation from the U.S. Department of Homeland Security, where he was the operations branch chief with the National Exercise Division. In this position, he was responsible for overseeing the design, development and conduct of exercises at the federal, state and local levels, including several national level and international exercises. Before joining DHS, Mr. Greenberg served as a legislative assistant in the U.S. House of Representatives and as a program assistant for the U.S. Department of Justice. He also spent more than 20 years as a volunteer firefighter, emergency medical technician, and adjunct instructor.

Shawn Henry

As president of CrowdStrike Services, Shawn Henry leads a world-class team of cybersecurity professionals who respond to computer network intrusions in order to mitigate advanced persistent threats. He retired as FBI executive assistant director in March 2012, with responsibility for all criminal and cyber programs and investigations worldwide, as well as international

operations and the FBI's critical incident response. Having served in multiple positions relating to cyber intrusions since 1999, Mr. Henry has been the bureau's outspoken top agent on cybersecurity issues, and is credited with boosting the FBI's computer crime and cybersecurity investigative capabilities. He was an original member of the National Cyber Study Group, under the direction of the Office of the Director of National Intelligence.

Bryan Koon

Bryan Koon is the director of the Florida Division of Emergency Management. Prior to joining the division, Mr. Koon served as Walmart's director of emergency management, after serving for three years as the senior operations manager in Walmart's emergency management department. In this role, he was responsible for all aspects of Walmart's emergency management efforts, including preparedness, planning, operations, recovery and mitigation. With a presence in every state plus operations in over 30 international locations, 2.2 million associates, and nearly 100,000 vendors and suppliers, every incident world-wide had a potential impact. The emergency management department's role is to manage those events and ensure customer and associate safety, maintain and restore business operations, and assist the community.

Prior to Walmart, Mr. Koon worked at the White House Military Office for seven years. He started as a watch officer in the president's Emergency Operations Center, when he was an active duty navy officer. He then spent two years as training officer for Presidential Contingency Programs, where he conducted training and exercises for the White House Military Office, United States Secret Service, Federal Emergency Management Agency and others. After concluding his active duty navy service, Mr. Koon continued to serve at the White House while working as a contractor from SRA, International. His specialty in the navy was as a surface warfare officer. He served on two ships, USS INDEPENDENCE (CV 62) and USS PORT ROYAL (CG 73), where he made several deployments.

Stan McKinney

As director of executive education programs at the Center for Homeland Defense and Security, Stan McKinney is responsible for leading the center's extensive executive education initiatives serving the homeland security priorities of the U.S. Department of Homeland Security, as well as local, state, tribal and federal agencies. He served as the director of the emergency management division for the state of South Carolina from 1993 through 2002, and NEMA president from 1997 to 1998. In 2001, Mr. McKinney was assigned on special detail to the U.S. Department of Justice as a senior emergency management advisor for state and local domestic preparedness issues. He was recalled to state service in 2003 and served as assistant to the chief of the South Carolina State Law Enforcement Division to support the development of a statewide homeland security program to ensure statewide implementation of national preparedness programs, policies, goals and objectives.

Jonathon Monken

Jonathon Monken was appointed by Gov. Pat Quinn as director of the Illinois Emergency Management Agency (IEMA) on February 14, 2011. As director, Mr. Monken oversees Illinois' disaster preparedness and response, nuclear safety and homeland security programs, as well as the agency's 225+ employees and a budget of more than \$618 million. He also serves as the Illinois Homeland Security Advisor to the Governor. Prior to becoming IEMA director, Mr. Monken served for two years as acting director of the Illinois State Police. In this capacity, he was in charge of a staff of 3,400 sworn and civilian personnel in five major divisions, including the third largest crime laboratory system in the world, and an annual agency budget of approximately \$428 million.

Mr. Monken graduated from the United States Military Academy at West Point, where his military class rank placed him in the top 1% of his class. He possesses a distinguished military career,

having served one tour of duty in Kosovo and two tours of duty in Iraq between January 2003 and December 2006. While serving with the United States Army, Captain Monken was awarded the Bronze Star Medal, Defense Meritorious Service Medal and the Army Commendation Medal with Device for valor in combat.

Jeffrey Mottley

Jeffrey Mottley is a 20-year veteran with the New Jersey State Police. Currently, he holds the rank of major and serves as the commanding officer of the New Jersey State Police Office of Emergency Management. Prior to this position, Maj. Mottley served in both the emergency response bureau as well as the recovery bureau within the State Police Office of Emergency Management. Recently, he was responsible for the development of the Public Safety Compound (PSC) for Super Bowl 48, which was played at the Meadowlands Sports Complex in East Rutherford, New Jersey. The PSC, an onsite Emergency Operations/Fusion Center, developed situational analysis reporting, and operational briefings for all activities surrounding the Super Bowl.

In October 2012, Maj. Mottley was named the state coordinating officer for the costliest natural disaster ever to impact the state of New Jersey, Superstorm Sandy. He was tasked with coordinating the state's recovery efforts in the joint field office from October 2012 to December 2013. Superstorm Sandy is estimated to exceed \$1.4 billion in public assistance disaster reimbursements when all funding is complete.

David Schilling

David Schilling is the deputy manager for the National Response Program in the Office of Intelligence, Security, and Emergency Response at the U. S. Department of Transportation. The program is responsible for coordinating departmental preparedness, response and recovery activities in all hazards crises for the Office of the Secretary, and in support of the secretary's responsibilities under the National Response Framework, Emergency Support Function #1 Transportation. Prior to joining this office, Mr. Schilling was the state programs team leader for the Federal Transit Administration in the region IV office in Atlanta, GA where he was responsible for the planning and program management duties related to federal transit funding for the southeast.

C. Robert Smith

Robert Smith is vice president of UPS Air Group and Transportation Security. A 36-year UPS veteran, he oversees security and regulatory compliance for one of the world's largest airlines, including more than 20,000 employees and the company's massive Worldport facility in Louisville, Ky. Worldport is the largest fully automated package handling facility in the world, processing an average of 1.6 million packages a day. Mr. Smith is also responsible for implementing the airline's security program as outlined by the Transportation Security Act, which involves crisis management and emergency response.

A graduate of Prince George's County Maryland Police Academy and the Maryland State Corrections Academy, Mr. Smith brings a wealth of experience in law enforcement and protection to his role. Before joining UPS, he worked security and briggs as a U.S. Marine, served as a police officer near Washington, D.C., and was also a sergeant in corrections. Mr. Smith serves on the board of the Crisis Management for Greater Louisville First Responders team, which together with the state, works to address crisis management, homeland security, disaster preparedness and related issues representing the private sector. He is chairperson for the Louisville Crisis Group Security sub-committee, which consists of the heads of security for major corporations in the area as well federal, state and city police.

Janay Stargell

Janay Stargell joined the Georgia Emergency Management Agency in January 2013. In her role of faith-based and non-governmental organizations coordinator, she helps counties establish Community Volunteer Organizations Active in Disaster (VOAD) groups, and assists state VOAD members. VOAD groups allow municipalities to become more prepared to recover from a disaster on their own in the event that the state may not be able to help. Ms. Stargell also coordinates assistance to counties that have been affected by a disaster with volunteer organizations to set them on the road to recovery.

Robert Stephan

Robert Stephan is executive director of Gryphon Scientific, a national capital region-based homeland security consulting firm. Prior to his current position, Mr. Stephan served the assistant secretary of homeland security for infrastructure protection within the U.S. Department of Homeland Security. With the initial activation of DHS in 2003, he served as special assistant to the secretary and director of the secretary's headquarters operational integration staff. In this capacity, he was responsible for a wide range of activities that included headquarters-level interaction in the areas of strategic and operational planning, core mission integration, domestic incident management, and training and exercises. Previously, Mr. Stephan served as the first senior director for critical infrastructure protection in the executive office of the President and held a variety of key operational and command positions in the joint special operations community during a 24-year Air Force career from which he retired a colonel.

Yee San Su

Since 2008, Dr. Yee San Su has been a researcher in CNA's Safety & Security Division. He has worked at both state and federal levels, using a variety of analytical, statistical and modeling techniques to support emergency preparedness assessments. Dr. Su has supported high-profile assessments for legislative and executive branch stakeholders, serving as task lead and senior advisor on the *National Preparedness Report* and lead on the 2013 *Emergency Support Function Report*. Prior to CNA, Dr. Su spent two years as an American Association for the Advancement of Science (AAAS) Science & Technology Policy Fellow in residence at the National Homeland Security Research Center. Before being awarded the AAAS fellowship, Dr. Su was a technical consultant at Exponent, Inc., a leading engineering and scientific consulting firm.

Robert Sweet

Robert Sweet is the senior advisor to the director and manager of significant incident management operations within the Federal Aviation Administration's Office of System Operations Security. As senior advisor, he is responsible for providing policy, strategic planning and program management counsel as well as support to the office's director and senior managers. In his second role, he serves as manager of FAA Air Traffic Organization national level emergency operations related programs and works with the U.S. Department of Transportation's National Response Program and federal, state, and local interagency partners.

Mr. Sweet began his aviation career as a management consultant with Arthur D. Little when he was assigned to work with the FAA to develop and establish a consolidated, technical-operations international program in 1994. Starting in 2002, Mr. Sweet increasingly worked with the defense department and other agencies on the reconstruction of the aviation systems in Afghanistan and Iraq. In 2004, he was asked to help establish a new security office, the System Operations Security directorate where he currently serves. He has since played a pivotal role in numerous national level security and disaster response efforts, including serving as the transportation secretary's representative in 2005 to the joint field office established in Baton Rouge, Louisiana immediately

after Hurricane Katrina breached the levees protecting that city. In that capacity, he was instrumental in planning the largest mass air evacuation in U.S. history. The critical role he played during that 2005 catastrophe has been reprised during many other events, including the August 2006 transatlantic liquid bomb plot, the 2009 Christmas Day bombing attempt, the January 2010 Haitian earthquake, and the April 2010 Deepwater Horizon oil spill.

Randy Trzeciak

Randy Trzeciak is with the Carnegie Mellon University Software Engineering Institute (SEI) and specifically serves as technical manager of the SEI CERT Enterprise Threat and Vulnerability Management Team and the CERT Insider Threat Center. The team's mission is to assist organizations improve their security posture and incident response capability by researching technical threat areas; developing and conducting information security assessments; and providing information, solutions and training for preventing, detecting, and responding to illicit activity. Team capabilities include threat analysis and modeling; building and evaluating insider threat programs; development of insider threat controls, workshops, and exercises. Mr. Trzeciak has more than 23 years of experience in software engineering, project management, information security, and database design, development and maintenance. He also is an adjunct professor at Carnegie Mellon's Heinz College, School of Information Systems and Management.

Robert "Mike" Walker

As senior consultant at the Center for Homeland Defense and Security, Mike Walker has lectured and acted as a panelist on the Mobile Education Teams since the inception of the program in 2002. His current research focuses on the terrorist threat and policy options for prevention. Prior to joining the CHDS, Mr. Walker served 32 years in the federal government and was confirmed four times by the U.S. Senate to serve in senior executive branch positions, including acting secretary of the Army, undersecretary of the Army, deputy director of FEMA, and undersecretary at the U.S. Department of Veteran Affairs. During his previous service to the U.S. Department of Defense, Mr. Walker oversaw DoD's military support to civil authorities and led DoD support to FEMA and the FBI following the bombing of the Murrah Federal Building in Oklahoma City. While serving at FEMA, he was responsible for overseeing the agency's terrorism and national security programs. Before his federal service in 1993, Mr. Walker was staff director of the Senate Subcommittee on Military Construction Appropriations.

Jim Williams

Jim Williams manages a team of professional emergency management staff, in support of the Asset Protection – Business Continuity Division and Security Operations Center for Walgreens. In this capacity, he's responsible for the emergency planning, preparation and response for the nearly 9100 locations of the entire Walgreens family of companies. Mr. Williams responds to both manmade and natural disasters that affect the Walgreens locations. Prior to joining Walgreens in 2011, he held various engineering & management positions at Bosch, Siemens & Underwriter's Laboratories. Mr. Williams is a retired veteran of the US Air Force, having achieved the rank of major.
